Amelia's Background

She was born Amelia Mary Earhart on July 24, 1897 in Atchison, Kansas. She married George Palmer Putnam on February 7, 1931. she got her pilot's license at 26 and bought a small yellow airplane that she called "The Canary" . She broke the altitude record for women by flying up 14,000 feet in the air. She was the first woman to fly solo across the Atlantic

and Pacific oceans. She died on July 2, 1937, trying to get to Howland's Island. Still today we don't know if she crashed or if her plane stopped over the ocean.



Did The Japanese Get To Amelia?

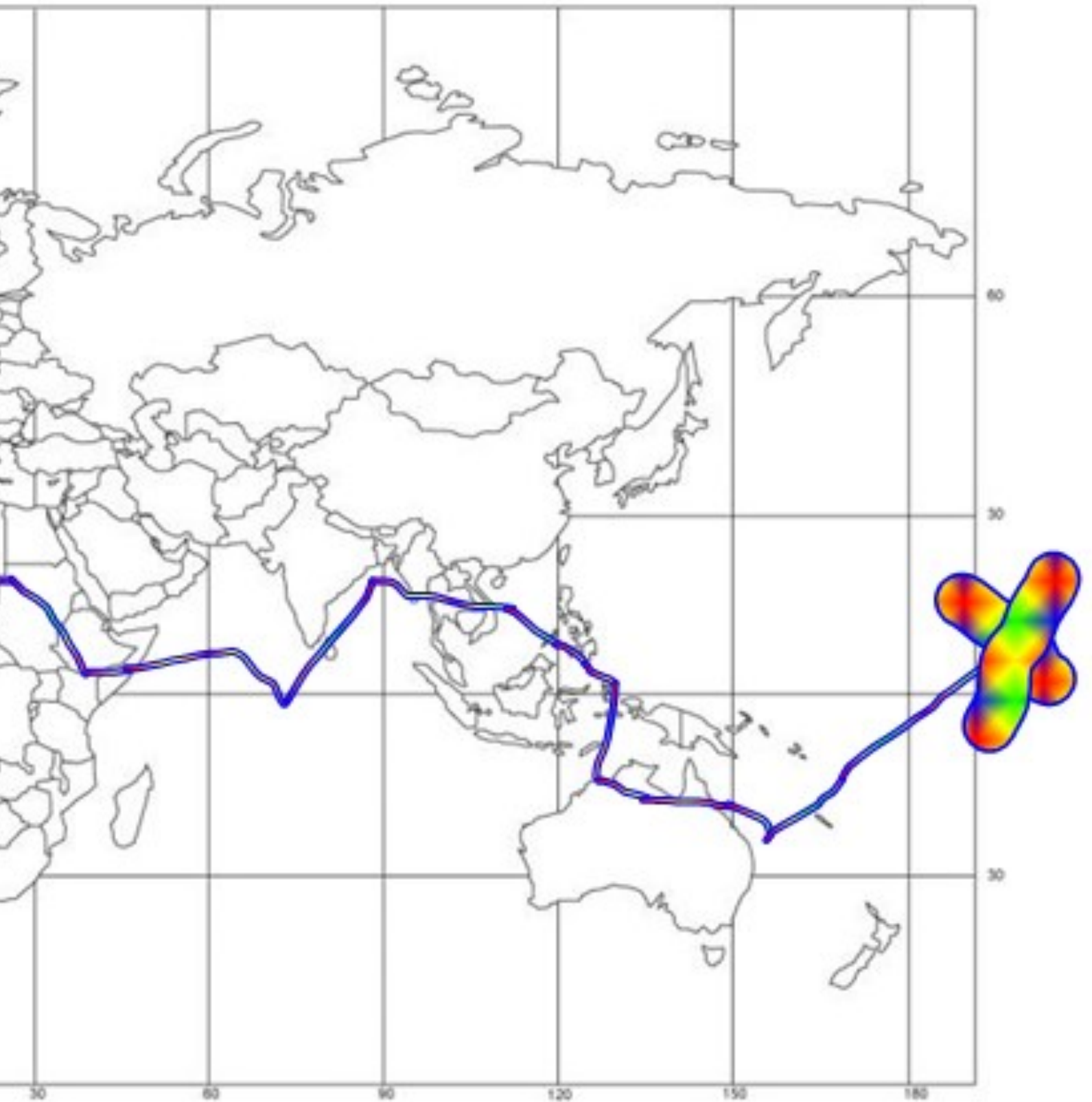
A few years before World War 2, Japanese took over many islands. People believe that Earhart was captured and possibly killed by them. The Japanese don't like that idea.
